Stan Vagionakis — Jenny Shone has a passion for animals. She is involved in an exclusive field known as animal healing, where the unfamiliar practice of telepathy is proving to be a highly effective component.

She got onto her life path from an early age. "I had a little Jack Russell called Smurfie, who was my soul mate. At the age of seven I lost her to cancer, which left me devastated," she says. She then decided there had to be a way she could help other animals and their owners. "So I started investigating. I did various Reiki courses as well as ESP healing, pet reflexology and

animal telepathic communication with top American communicator, Amelia Kinkade, in the Isle of Man," she says. Jenny says when she first started running her workshops there were not many others in the country offering the same services, but animal healing and telepathic communication have grown quickly since then. "Although there are still some skeptics, generally most people are fascinated and ready to learn these techniques," she says.

Jenny is launching a book which she started two years ago, accompanied by a CD which offers people from all walks of life the chance to

perform the work she does. The book also gives insight into her work, and retells numerous personal stories during her practice in this arcane field. She believes everyone has the ability to communicate telepathically, and it is not a gift but rather a learnt skill which requires patience and practice. "In my workshops you learn techniques which you then go home and practice. Most people are already communicating without knowing it," she says. The CD, which she recorded just over a week ago, serves as a medium for meditation. Meditations are also described in her book, enabling people to practice

communicating with their pets at home. "The rewards of doing this are amazing, especially seeing animals respond to either healing or communication," she says. "One of my favorite stories happened just after going on my course in the Isle of Man. I had one day before flying back to SA and decided to spend it at the London Zoo chatting to animals. In the distance I saw a crowd gathered and went to investigate. They were looking at a beautiful camel. I decided to chat to this camel, but didn't want to stand with all the other people, so I stood way off. I said to him, 'I am an animal communicator from

SA and would like to chat to you. I'm standing behind you to your right, if you can hear me and want to chat please look at me and wink with your left eye.' A few seconds later he turned around, looked me right in the eye and winked. I asked him if he was happy. He said he was, but also bored. I then asked what he thought of all the people that came to see him. He replied they were very amusing, but were not there to look at him, but him to look at them.
